

Base of 5th Metatarsal Foot Fracture



- Occasionally the fracture will not heal and will be painful, even after several months. In these cases an operation is sometimes required.

- You have fractured (broken) a bone on the outer part of your foot.
- This fracture occurred in a part of the bone that normally heals well without problems.
- Depending on your levels of pain, the foot may be supported with bandaging or a removable shoe. If needed, you may also be offered crutches.
- You can put as much weight through the foot as the pain will allow and take simple pain killers to allow you to do so.
- If you have been given a boot, you can remove this for washing or at night. You can discard this whenever you feel able to do so, normally within 3-5 weeks.

If you have any urgent concerns out of hours, you can find help at NHS 111 (dial 111) or by proceeding directly to your local Emergency Department where the on-call trauma service can review you.
