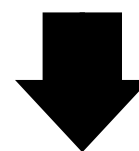

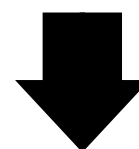
You have either had your mole or lesion removed today

or

we will plan for it to be removed within the next 31 days.



Your mole or lesion will go to the Pathology Department where it will be examined to establish a diagnosis. This can take up to 4 weeks.



You will receive an appointment to see the Skin Specialist Nurse 4-5 weeks after your mole or lesion was removed to be given the results. You are more than welcome to bring a family member or friend with you to this appointment.
