CQC report published on services at the Royal Devon

The Care Quality Commission published a report on following its short-notice inspection of the Royal Devon University Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust's diagnostic imaging, medical and surgical care services at both acute hospitals at the end of 2022.

This was in response to the Trust reporting 16 never events between March 2021 and November 2022.

Diagnostic imaging services have been rated as good, while the ratings for the inspection in medicine and surgery show a decrease in some areas and the services have been rated as requires improvement.

Chris Tidman, Deputy Chief Executive Officer, said: "We are pleased that our diagnostic imaging services have been rated good. We are of course disappointed by the results in our medical and surgical services, however we feel it is a fair reflection of the challenges the Trust and our teams were under at the time of the inspection."

Update from Government about the New Hospital Programme

The Government provided an update in Parliament on Thursday 25 May about the national New Hospital Programme, which includes North Devon District Hospital (NDDH).

Steve Barclay, Secretary of State for Health and Social Care, announced that the Government has set aside a significant envelope of more than £20bn for the programme, with continuous investment beyond 2030. He confirmed that the Government remains committed to NDDH as part of the programme, and indicated that we can progress with phase 1 of our scheme, to develop new staff accommodation and to start enabling works to the hospital site.

We welcome this announcement and are delighted that there is an ambitious plan for rebuilding NDDH so that it can continue to offer high quality care to the people of North Devon in the decades to come. We are also pleased about the commitment to early investment to rebuild our staff accommodation, which is hugely important in supporting our ambitions to be a great place to work, so that we can recruit and retain the very best people.

We look forward to working closely with the national programme team to learn more about when and how we can progress our scheme, and we will keep you updated when we know more.



Working together to transform healthcare across the peninsula

Clinicians from NHS organisations in Devon, Cornwall and Isles of Scilly are working together on plans to stabilise and transform acute services for local people and staff in a programme called the Peninsula Acute Sustainability Programme (PASP).

PASP aims to ensure clinical, workforce and financial sustainability of services at the five acute hospitals in Devon and Cornwall.

The challenge:

- Within our services there are hundreds of clinical vacancies across vital health and care roles, with many colleagues likely to retire in the next five to 10 years.
- As a result, many people are now waiting too long for their care such as planned procedures, cancer care and in emergency departments.
- There are also unacceptable variations in the quality of care in some services, while health inequalities are widening between our most deprived and most affluent communities.

These challenges are too great for organisations and systems to tackle on their own, so we are working together across Devon, Cornwall and Isles of Scilly on ideas to address them.

We are working in partnership with the UK's leading provider of disabled access information, <u>AccessAble</u>, to produce Detailed Access Guides for users of our sites. 1000th hip/knee operation carried out at the Nightingale Hospital Exeter to help further reduce Devon's waiting lists



The 1000th hip/knee replacement taking place

The South West Ambulatory Orthopaedic Centre (SWAOC) has hit another major milestone, completing its 1,000th knee/hip replacement since opening at the Nightingale in March 2022.

Frankie Wilson from Sidmouth, who received the 1,000th replacement, said: "I feel honoured to have helped the Nightingale hit this milestone, and coming here has been a great experience. I've had pain from my left knee for about two years now, so to be able to look forward to that stopping and not having to use two sticks anymore is wonderful. I've been really impressed with the facilities here and just how efficient everything is. The staff are all amazing, and the peace and quiet is just what you need to help with your recovery."

The centre, one of only eight elective surgical hubs in the country to have been GiRFT accredited and recognised nationally for its high clinical and operational standard, has also expanded its services to include hindfoot and soft-tissue knee operations.

The brand new £1.4m facility has been developed at the former renal unit at South Molton Community Hospital. This was made possible with a generous donation of £500,000 from the South Molton Hospital League of Friends.

The centre will provide diagnostic services and treatments for people with new eye problems and people managing long-term conditions, such as glaucoma and medical retina.

The additional capacity and state of the art equipment provided at the centre will help provide a more positive and efficient experience for our patients, complementing the ophthalmology treatments currently provided at Bideford Community Hospital and North Devon District Hospital.

Lead research nurse awarded Aster Guardians Global Nursing Award 2023

Royal Devon takes delivery of new Da Vinci XI robots

The Trust is very pleased to have taken delivery of two new Da Vinci XI robots. This is a second robot for our RD&E (Wonford) hospital to support expanded use in head and neck surgery, as well as urology.

This is the first robot for NDDH and a major investment in surgery in North Devon. The new robot at NDDH will be used predominantly for our complex abdominal wall service and colorectal surgery, with future use planned in gynaecology and other services.

These robots allow the surgeon to perform keyhole surgery but with the use of fully articulating wrists, the instruments act like the surgeons' hands, controlled from an operating console.

Robotic surgery allows complex procedures to be performed with increased accuracy and precision, allowing keyhole surgery to be performed rather than open surgery. This supports patients to recover faster and have a shorter stay in hospital.



Eye clinics re-open in Sidmouth and Tiverton

The West of England Eye unit (Ophthalmology) has reopened Sidmouth and Tiverton community hospitals' macular injection clinics, glaucoma clinics, and cataract clinics, following closure during the pandemic.
