

Training and development with funded qualifications

If you're looking for a career and not just a job, the Royal Devon is the perfect place for you. We'll welcome you into the fold with bespoke learning and development opportunities and a package of support, mentorship, and guidance to enhance your wellbeing and transform your skillset.

Aseptic careers

You can join the team as a Band 2 Aseptic Assistant and gain your Level 2 qualification. This will place you in an excellent position for joining our apprenticeship programme to become a Band 3 Scientific Manufacturing Technician (SMT). From here, you can gain further experience and training to become a Band 4 Senior SMT.

If you are a Band 5 Aseptic Technician, we will help you achieve your career goals as you progress your career.

Pharmacy Technician careers

The Royal Devon offers excellent career routes for Pharmacy Technicians.

You can start your career by applying for a Band 2 Pharmacy Assistant role and gaining valuable experience before joining our apprenticeship programme. You will be studying and working as a Pre-Registration Trainee Pharmacy Technician whilst completing the level three course. This is fully funded via the apprenticeship levy.

Qualified Technicians must register with the General Pharmaceutical Council (GPhC).

Where this could take you

We offer excellent career progression for Pharmacy and Aseptic Technicians through dedicated learning opportunities. For Technicians, you can achieve further qualifications and experience to equip you with advanced skills and specialist knowledge to take on senior posts.

Pharmacists

Pharmacists complete a four-year Masters of Pharmacy (MPharm) degree programme at University.

Your course must be recognised by the General Pharmaceutical Council (GPhC), and the entry criteria are set by the relevant university. Usually, the requirement is for A-B grade A-levels in chemistry and two further A-levels in an approved science subject.

For those who don't meet the entry criteria, you may be able to access a GPhC-accredited foundation degree as an alternative route to enter the MPharm degree.

Trainee Pharmacists

Trainee Pharmacists join the Royal Devon as a Band 5 and will need to complete pre-registration training over the course of a year and pass the GPhC exam to achieve registration status.

We offer a number of trainee pharmacist placements each year within our acute sites, our community pharmacies, and the local mental health trust. We also offer a limited number of cross-sector foundation trainee pharmacists in general practice posts.

Following this, you will become a Band 6 Newly Qualified Pharmacist.

Where this could take you

For Qualified Pharmacists, you can explore post-graduate diplomas and non-medical prescribing as well as education, academia, and research. We'll help you work towards advanced practice, supporting you with credentialing and providing lots of opportunities for portfolio-based activities.

Aseptic careers

Our aseptic units are state-of-the-art sterile facilities where injectable medicines are manufactured, such as chemotherapy treatment and specialist treatment for specialties such as ophthalmology, rheumatology and gastroenterology.

Collaborating with a team of dedicated professionals, you'll work together to manufacture specialist injectable medications in a controlled environment, using your meticulous approach and impressive attention to detail to follow strict protocols with support from your colleagues.

What do I need to do?

You don't need experience to get started! We'll provide all training on the job to help you build your confidence and learn and develop aseptic manufacturing techniques. You will work towards achieving a level-2 qualification in Pharmacy Manufacturing. This can provide opportunities to progress to a Band 3 Aspectic Assistant role.

Band 3 Aseptic Assistants

Once you have achieved the level 2 qualification in Pharmacy Manufacturing you are eligible to take on a Scientific Manufacturing Technician training programme. Once completed, this apprenticeship route will open up the potential to become a Scientific Manufacturing Technician. At a Glance

Band 2 Aseptic Assistants

If you have a passion for science and would like to use your technical mindset to make a real difference to our patients, then why not start your career as part of our aseptic team? Situated at the heart of the hospital, we produce injectable medicines in sterile environments for specialties such as Oncology, Paediatrics, and Rheumatology.

As an Aseptic Assistant, you'll be working under the guidance of Aseptic Technicians, Scientific Manufacturing Technicians and other senior members of the department. Your role will rotate between stores, assembly, and clean room environments, contributing to the manufacturing of drug therapies and clinical trials medicines.



Band 3 Scientific Manufacturing Technician Apprentice

Based in the aseptic department, Band 3 Scientific Manufacturing Technician Apprentices are vital for how we run our services. You'll be directly assisting production, whether this is by operating systems and helping with technology, preparing sterile environments, or guiding the delivery of prescriptions.

What do I need to do?

Once you have achieved the level 2 qualification in Pharmacy Manufacturing you are eligible to take on a Scientific Manufacturing Technician training programme. This is an apprenticeship, where you will be working as a Band 3 as you train on the job. From here, you will to a Band 4 Scientific Manufacturing Technician.

Band 4 Senior Scientific Manufacturing Technician

As you grow in confidence, you'll be able to master new skills and gain essential experience. You'll also be able to take on increased responsibility, taking part in pre and in-process checking, and making sure best practice is at the forefront of all activities.

Achieving Band 4 Senior Scientific Manufacturing Technician (SMT) status will see you providing training and sharing expertise as well as contributing to the running of the department.

Aseptic Pharmacy Technicians

Accuracy is key, and you'll have dedicated support from your colleagues.

Band 5

Band 5 Aseptic Pharmacy Technicians enter the role following completion of the Pharmacy Technician Apprenticeship programme and developing specialist Aseptic knowledge. You will also need to register with the General Pharmaceutical Council (GPhC).

Next steps

Aseptic Technicians can advance to a Senior Technician role by taking on further study such as diplomas and checking courses. This is alongside gaining in-depth knowledge and acting within a management capacity as you progress. At a Glance

The course has allowed me to complete on-the-job funded training, which was a fantastic opportunity to study while working. If you're interested in progressing in pharmacy or you're thinking of starting a new career, this course is ideal.

The most important thing about pharmacy is that no matter what department you're in you have an impact on a patient's life, you're helping them to manage their existing or new conditions through medications. There's no better feeling then helping patients.

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Band 6 Aseptic Pharmacy Technicians

Registered Band 6 Aseptic Pharmacy Technicians have greater responsibility, contributing to the management of the department, supporting colleagues, and product approval.

We will support you with guidance, mentorship, and dedicated time to study, as well as provide opportunities to explore your area of interest and learn from other professionals within your chosen field.

Once you have achieved Band 6 status, you can continue your professional development and may have the opportunity to become Band 7 Chief Aseptic Technician.

Band 7 Chief Aseptic Pharmacy Technician

Band 7 Chief Aseptic Technicians are responsible for running the aseptic department, managing capacity, maintenance, and liaising with stakeholders.

You'll act as an integral mentor for new starters, assisting with the training of Band 2 – Band 6 professionals as well as taking responsibility for protocols and procurement.

You'll also have the opportunity to advance to further senior positions by accessing in-house training and external courses as well as building your experience.

Pharmacy Technician careers

Pharmacy Technicians work alongside Pharmacists throughout our acute and community services, supporting our busy dispensaries, clinical settings, and the wider pharmacy department.

Alongside preparing medicines, checking prescriptions, and delivering supplies, you will play a vital role in making sure patients and carers understand how to take their medication. This will include instructing on dosage, duration, and frequency as well as providing advice to specialties across the Trust.

On the wards, you will support by maintaining patient drug charts and helping with queries such as missed dosage or supply as well as making sure patients have everything they need ready for discharge.

Band 2 Pharmacy Assistants

Begin your career journey as a Pharmacy Assistant and learn how to safely dispense and distribute medicines, transforming the way our patients can access our services.

You'll be ensuring the safety and recovery of our patients by providing impeccable service across our acute sites and within our communities, making sure the right person receives the right medication at the right time.

You'll be supported every step of the way by a team who feel just like a family.

How do I get started?

You don't need any experience to get started! We'll provide all training on the job to help you build your confidence and learn and develop essential skills. You will work towards achieving a level-2 qualification whilst building practical knowledge, helping you to earn as you learn.

Next steps

Band 2 Pharmacy Assistants can progress to a Band 3 Senior Pharmacy Assistant position after achieving the relevant level 2 qualification. This opens up opportunities to further develop your dispensing skills, learn about controlled drugs, and master complex dispensing procedures whilst gaining essential underpinning knowledge needed for the role.

Band 4 Pharmacy Technician

Pharmacy Technicians are equipped with an impressive set of skills including dispensing, medicines management, and in-depth knowledge about specialist areas. Alongside their technical capabilities, Pharmacy Technicians are compassionate about patient care, ensuring that those who use our services receive individualised care and professional counsel.

The Royal Devon can support you with dedicated apprenticeship and non-apprenticeship routes to become a Band 4 Pharmacy Technician.

How do I get started?

You will need four GCSEs at grade $A^* - C/9 - 4$, (three of which must include English language, Mathematics and one Science subject, Biology or Chemistry), to join the apprenticeship programme. You will need to complete an access exam before starting the course, which we will support you with.

Next steps

Once complete, you'll be able to register with the GPhC by completing an application to confirm you have a GPhC-approved qualification, and that you have achieved two years of experience working under the guidance of an Educational Supervisor.

Band 5 Senior Pharmacy Technician



Lucie Adcock Trainee Pharmacy Technician I joined the Royal Devon in November 2021 as a rotational pharmacy assistant, but have since been given the fantastic opportunity to undertake the two-year Trainee Pharmacy Technician Apprenticeship, where at the end of the two years, I will be a GPhC registered Pharmacy Technician. I am four months into the course, which is a combination of training on the job and one day a week studying online at college.

My career journey started about four years ago when I started within the community where I completed my NVQ level 2 as a Pharmacy Assistant, and then moved to a commercial Community Pharmacy. I decided to try a hospital setting in Barnstaple and I can honestly say I haven't looked back since!

For me, working in pharmacy is particularly exciting because of the amount of knowledge and skills you gain. I am currently studying a module with Bradford College about the actions and uses of medicines, which is really interesting to learn about, and I am so excited to be able to apply my newfound knowledge when I qualify.

Working with the Royal Devon has changed my life. Everyone is so friendly, encouraging, and empowering. They have allowed me to come out of my comfort zone, explore my own interests under the supervision of my line manager, and discover interests I never knew I had. My line manager has already encouraged me to begin thinking about anything I would like to specialise in for my own personal development prospects. I am aware of multiple routes I could take to progress.



Band 5 Medicines Management Technician

Reaching a Band 5 position will reward you with great autonomy and responsibility. As a Medicines Management Technician, you'll have direct patient contact and specialist skills in medicines reconciliation.

You'll have the backing of your friendly team, whether you are working within our busy acute sites, or in a community setting.

As you grow and learn, you will have the opportunity to take on further responsibilities and build your knowledge including completing a course approved by Pharmacy Workforce Development South. This would put you in good stead when applying for a Band 6 position.

Other roles for Pharmacy Technicians

Pharmacy Technicians have the potential to embark on a wide range of courses, achieving in-house training and other courses. This is an excellent way to become eligible for Band 6 roles following the successful completion of courses offered by Pharmacy Workforce Development South.

As a Renal Pharmacy Technician, my day-to-day role can include completing medicines reconciliation for newly admitted patients, arranging discharge medication, counselling on new medication, and attending transplant clinics to answer any medication queries that patients and colleagues might have.

I enjoy problem-solving and the challenge of explaining things to people with different levels of understanding. It's rewarding to help a patient understand how important their medication can be and help them create a system that works for them. We have a great team with a good relationship between Pharmacy and the wider multi-disciplinary team. We share resources and discuss how to move forward with patient care.

Training has widened the scope of my role! Everyone in my team has been offered the chance to complete extra qualifications and there is plenty of support.

Pharmacist careers

Pharmacists work alongside Pharmacy Technicians to make sure all medication is carefully managed from admission to discharge. The majority of our inpatient wards will be visited daily by a Clinical Pharmacist, who will work alongside Doctors, Nurses and other healthcare professionals to make sure our patients receive the right medication and dosage for their individual needs. This also includes careful consideration of previous medication taken at home, contraindications, and relationships between simultaneous drug therapies.

We'll help you work towards advanced practice, supporting you with credentialing and providing lots of opportunities for portfolio based activities that will benchmark you against other professionals across the UK.

Band 5 Trainee Pharmacists

Trainee Pharmacists enter as a Band 5 pre-registration professional having completed a Masters of Pharmacy (MPharm) degree that is accredited by the General Pharmaceutical Council (GPhC).

Guided by senior members of your team and working alongside Pharmacy Technicians and Pharmacy Support colleagues, you'll be using your theoretical knowledge and gaining hands-on experience as you undertake your year of professional registration training.

Following successful completion of pre-registration training, you will need to register with the GPhC by completing the exam and registration requirements. Registered Pharmacists become Band 6 after registration.



Band 6 Newly Qualified Pharmacist

Following successful completion of your pre-registration training, you will register with the GPhC to become an official Newly Qualified Pharmacist.

Each day will present new and exciting challenges, whether you are involved with the assembly of medication and carrying out checking protocols, or visiting acute wards to clinically screen charts and discuss the medical history of newly admitted patients. You could also be working within a community setting.

Alongside patient contact, you'll work with many other professionals such as Consultants, Doctors, Nurses, Therapists and Healthcare Support Workers. Your combined expertise will make a huge difference to the patients we care for, transforming their quality of life and ensuring they have the right medication for their condition.

Did you know that there are healthcare professionals called Independent Prescribers who are qualified to prescribe medication? To become one, you can take an accredited program that equips you with the necessary skills to prescribe drugs safely and competently. If you're interested in pursuing this qualification, we'd be happy to assist you in checking the entry criteria with the course provider. As part of the new MPharm Degree, you will graduate with your prescribing qualification.

Band 7 Senior Pharmacists

As a Band 7 Senior Pharmacist, you will have a range of specialist responsibilities that include leadership roles and clinical rotations. Your experience could lead to opportunities for further courses, in-house training, and clinical pharmacy qualifications.

Your duties may involve leading on medicines management, providing senior-level counselling to patients, and preparing complex prescriptions that include additional medications for symptom relief.

Your work will make a significant impact on patients receiving care, whether you're supporting the provision of antiemetics to alleviate nausea from chemotherapy or delivering a prescription of analgesia to improve a patient's comfort as part of their end-of-life care plan.

I've participated in a wide range of rotations through my Band 6 and pre-registration rotations which have included cross-sector rotations as well as inpatient rotations such as surgery, oncology, radiopharmacy and aseptic services. I also participate in dispensary rotations, late nights and on-call shifts.

I completed my A Levels in biology, chemistry and sociology and went on to study a Masters of Pharmacy at University of Bath. Following completion of my oriel application, I started my pre-registration training year at the Royal Devon and have remained here throughout my early years as a junior pharmacist.

We have a very friendly department where everyone is willing to help regardless of what team they are in. I love living in Devon – the local attractions, beaches, and outdoor activities make living here very pleasant!

- Aseptic/Pharmacy Assistants are usually paid within Band 2
- Scientific Manufacturing Technicians are paid at Band 3, advancing to Band 4 in a senior post.
- Pharmacy Technicians are paid at Band 4
- Trainee Pharmacists begin at a Band 5 level and become Band 6 after successful completion of their pre-registration year
- Specialist Pharmacists can be paid at Band 8a, Pharmacy Management roles can be Band 8b and Band 8c, and Chief Pharmacists can reach Band 9.
